Summary of Priorities Noted at March 2016 Steering Committee Meeting Input for 2016 County Budget (updated 4/14/2015)

Note: The numbering does not imply priority but the order ideas were shared.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

- 1. Access to psychiatrists within a reasonable amount of time, especially for individuals on Medicaid.
- 2. Movement in Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) roll out in Milwaukee County to ensure eligible individuals get services more quickly and increase the number of people enrolled in CCS.
- 3. Reduce and/or eliminate waiting list for Community Support Program (CSP) and Targeted case Management (TCM). Reminder that CSP is an entitlement.
- 4. Increase availability of peer support during key transition times (i.e., between levels of service, when going through significant changes, etc.)
- 5. Increased access to employment supports including job development, job coaching and benefits counselling.
- 6. Availability of drop in centers in multiple locations (north side especially) and open for more hours --with various focus at each like art etc.
- 7. Increased community education to increase awareness of prevention, available services, etc, i.e., mental health first aid training
- 8. Community Resource Centers to provide information about mental health services, help with determining eligibility, benefits counselling, etc as shown in the Cultural Intelligence Model

CRISIS SERVICES

- 1. The Two Crisis Resource Centers (CRC) should expand their hours of intake coverage to have 24/7 intake capacity. Also more flexible with who they will admit and serve.
- 2. Need for more mobile crisis teams working with police. Note: Significant expansion will be needed if the state budget provisions regarding crisis assessment and emergency detention go forward.
- 3. Ability for mobile crisis teams to be able to respond much more quickly when needed.
- 4. Availability of peer run respite centers in Milwaukee County

ACROSS THE BOARD

- 1. More peer support throughout the system, throughout all programs.
- 2. Make individuals with high criminal justice concerns and high mental health concerns a priority in accessing services. We are hearing concerns from the community that some individuals experiencing a mental health crisis who have had interaction with the criminal justice system are no longer being admitted at the Complex when there is a need for inpatient care and instead begin sent to jail.

- 3. More transitional housing, as well as the entire continuum of housing –supportive and independent living. Lack of affordable housing.
- 4. Mental health board too focused on inpatient and not enough on community services
