Achieving Our Vision

- Reflect the full diversity of Milwaukee County at every level of County government.
- Create and nurture an inclusive culture across the Milwaukee County government.
- Increase the number of Milwaukee County contracts awarded to minority- and women-owned business.

Bridge the Gap

- Determine what, where, and how we deliver services based on the resolution of health disparities.
- Break down silos across the County government to maximize access to and quality of services offered.
- Apply a racial equity lens to all decisions.

Invest in Equity

- **Invest "upstream"** to address root causes of health disparities.
- Enhance Milwaukee County's fiscal health and sustainability.
- Dismantle barriers to diverse and inclusive communities.



2023 Budget Outlook

- Milwaukee County continues to be impacted by an **ongoing structural deficit** caused by state revenue caps and increased cost of state mandated services.
- On average, revenues grow by less than 1.0% per year while expenses are expected to increase by approximately 2.5% (average inflation).
- 2022 operating budget **gap of \$12.6 million** estimated for 2023.
- The increased cost of state mandates including an increase in the youth census and historically high inflation may significantly increase the gap we are facing
- County currently experiencing approximately 20% vacancy rate in current employment market, placing significant strain on operations
- 2023 capital project requests exceed available funding by \$84 million
- Federal recovery funds are available for one-time purposes.
- Sustainable solutions remain needed to remove financial constraints and allow the County to invest in local needs and priorities.



Vacancies


- Historically, County vacancy rate had been less than 10%
- In current labor market, vacancy rate has reached approximately 20% on average and is higher in some departments
- General employees to receive 4% increases in 2022 (2% in April, 2% August)
- One-time lump sum payment being awarded with one-time funds
- Targeted pay increase for Correction Officer staff
- Revision to employee benefits including paid parental leave, remote work option where possible, and other items being considered
- HR is working with outside vendor to revisit pay structure
- Revenue caps and structural deficit continue to place limitations on compensation



County Has Drastically Reduced Spending

- Milwaukee County has closed budget gaps of approximately \$300 million over the past decade. Savings examples:
 - Reduced Footprint by 1.6 million sq. ft.
 - Restructure of Post Employee Benefits (OPEB)
 - Restructure to Work Comp
 - Deferring Maintenance
 - Staff Reduction of 1,400 (excluding DHHS)
 - Salary Step Freezes
 - Employee Health & Pension Contribution
 - VRF Revenue

Milwaukee County has sought savings from administration and overhead first **to avoid cuts to services**. \$9 million

Structural Deficit Continues to Grow

- Comptroller's Five Year Forecast projects deficit to grow to \$87 million 2027
- The deficit grows by \$39.9 million in 2025, largely due to the expected expiration of federal ARPA funds dedicated to Transit
- The Five Year forecast projects a 2025 gap of \$32M in Transit alone, which presents a major risk for the Milwaukee County Transit System without additional revenue streams

Closing the 2023 Budget Gap

- In the request phase, departments were asked to submit budget requests with the same amount of tax levy as 2022.
 - Inflationary increases and compensation adjustments are not funded and must be absorbed.
- Other possible actions:
 - Debt Service Reserve.
 - Recovery Funds (for One-Time Items).
 - Health Care Projections/Plan Design.
 - Additional Expenditure Reductions



Limited Revenue Options



Property Tax

Wisconsin has the 6th highest property tax burden in the United States. A 60% increase in Milwaukee County's property tax levy is necessary to generate revenue equal to a 1% sales tax increase.



Vehicle Registration Fee

An increased wheel tax cannot generate revenue at scale with local governments' needs and is limited to transportation expenses.



Money from the State

State aid has been flat since 2012 and would require a 600% increase to generate revenue similar to a 1% sales tax increase.



Sales Tax

An additional 1% sales tax provides \$180 million in locally-generated revenue to address local priorities and would grow with increased economic activity.


Requires State Approval

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

- Milwaukee County received **\$183 million allocation** of ARPA local recovery funds.
- Funds are to be incurred by 2024 for designated purposes related to COVID-19 response, economic recovery, and revenue loss due to the pandemic.
- ARPA funds are **temporary** and should be applied to **non-recurring expenditures**.
- Milwaukee County revenue loss is projected to be more than double its ARPA allocation
- Board of Supervisors created **ARPA Task Force** to review funding options and make non-binding recommendations.
