

Background

On December 15, 2021, the Milwaukee County Board approved Resolution 21-1127 which authorized Corporation Counsel to enter into a Settlement Agreement.

- Purchase harm reduction and prevention supplies
- Hire a Prevention Specialist in Partnership with Vivent Health

In 2022 The State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services received State Opioid Response (SOR) funds from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) were regranted to the Community Access to Recovery Services (CARS) department of the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Behavioral Health Services (BHS).

- Purchase vending machines
- Purchase vending harm reduction and prevention supplies

Behavioral Health Services of Milwaukee County Department of Health & Human Services will partner with Vivent Health's Lifepoint program and HRI Vending to increase Milwaukee County residents' access to harm reduction and prevention via vending machines located in businesses and public buildings across Milwaukee County.
