Strategic Program Area 1 – Administration

- The CRC's hiring team has been very successful in reducing the vacancy rates and will continue to attract a diverse workforce. In 2022 the CRC had a 36% vacancy rate, currently the rate is 23%, and the goal for 2024 is 11%
- Creation of one Contract Services Administrator position to help manage the CRC's contracts which totals over \$29 Million.



Strategic Program Area 3 - Resident Medical & Mental Health


- Expenditures in this area will increase in 2024 by \$573,490 due to contractual increases with the county's correctional health care provider.
- The 2024 budget will continue a grant from the opioid settlement agreement which allows the CRC to increase services to our residents who suffer from opioid addiction.



Strategic Program Area 3 - Resident Medical & Mental Health Continued

Medication Assisted Treatment at the CRC

Currently, the MAT program is managed by a 0.5 FTE MAT Coordinator and a 0.5 RN. BHS was awarded a \$773,000 grant through the Opioid Settlement Agreement allowing the MAT program to expand to a 1.0 FTE MAT Coordinator, a 1.0 FTE RN, a 1.0 FTE LPN, a 1.5 FTE Certified Peer Support Specialist and a 1.5 FTE Behavioral Health Counselor. When the funding is released, and the new positions are filled, Wellpath will expand the program to pre-trial residents and those sentenced to shorter confinements at the CRC. Currently, only those sentenced to 90 days, or more are eligible due to staffing issues. The goal is to accommodate over 70 participants at one time.







Strategic Program Area 4 - CRC Programming

- The Human Service Worker assists residents in eliminating barriers to include SS cards, ID, etc.
- Those sentenced to 90 days or more will have a reentry plan completed. This provides a better understanding of what our residents' needs are, and how we can better assist with those needs.
- The Family Outreach Coordinator works with correctional staff to respond to inquiries, requests, concerns and/or complaints raised by family members of individuals in the custody of CRC.



Strategic Program Area 4 - CRC Programming Continued

Wellpath Discharge Planner

- Wellpath currently utilizes a Discharge Planner (DP) on their team to assist residents with successfully transitioning into the community.
- The DP will meet the resident after an initial assessment and assist with:
 - Housing needs
 - Case management
 - Mental health care
 - Financial planning
 - · Applying for Medicaid
 - Setting up outside medical appointments
- The DP will coordinate with existing CRC employees (Peer Support Specialist, Human Service Worker, and Housing Navigator) in order to maximize the resources that are available to residents and therefore increase their chances of becoming successful citizens that are less likely to become involved in the Criminal Justice System.

Closing

- The recommended budget is aligned with Milwaukee County's vision and provides resources that will have a positive impact on staff, residents, and the community.
- The post-pandemic management of the CRC brings about the reality of an increased population with staffing shortages. Hiring, training, and retaining staff will always be a major priority.
- This budget proposal does not cut any programs that would impact those returning to the community.
