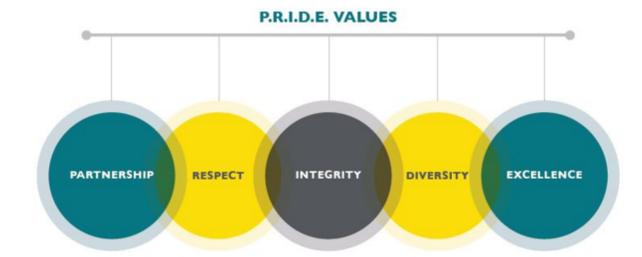

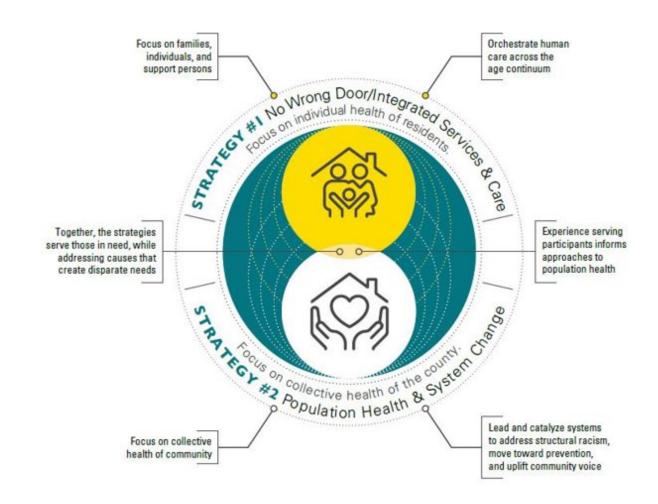

TWO STRATEGIES

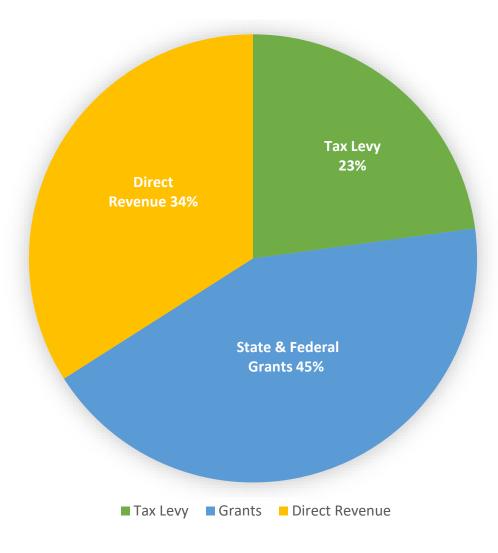

- Majority of DHHS funding derived from state/federal sources – only 23% of DHHS services are funded by tax levy
- Additional American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and Opioid Settlement funding is anticipated in 2024, but not included in initial budget requests

New Position Highlights

Aging & Disabilities Services

- 8.0 FTE new positions are created in the Aging and Disability Resource Center. This expansion is funded
 by Independent Living Support Project Pilot (ILSP) grant funds. The pilot program will help improve
 people's ability to stay in their own homes, potentially easing the increased burden on Wisconsin's longterm care system as our population ages.
- 1.0 FTE Deputy Director Position is created to support ongoing operational needs

8.0 FTE new homelessness prevention and intervention positions funded by HUD

Behavioral Health Services

- 7.0 FTE New Peer Specialist positions to support Mobile Crisis and CSP AOT Team
- 4.0 New paid internship positions to support ongoing workforce development

Commitment to Realizing the Vision

Highlights

- The work to build 120 affordable homes in the neighborhood surrounding the Marcia P. Coggs building is underway to increase BIPOC homeownership.
- Groundbreaking for the new Marcia P. Coggs Health & Human Services building will take place in 2023. For the first time, Milwaukee County will have a building designed to deliver person-centered human services.
- With the "Unwinding of Medicaid," developing a robust strategy to support individuals who may be impacted, and a strong awareness campaign to help customers avoid being disenrolled.
- Responding to the public health emergency of youth gun violence by improving access for families and responsiveness to situations, including expanding the Credible Messenger program with a partnership to specifically serve girls and creating a 'response team.'
- Addressing the overdose epidemic by investing in evidence-based harm reduction strategies. beginning with placing 11 Harm Reduction Vending Machines in data-driven locations across the county.
